Family Spotlight: The Thomas Family





Tumultuous. That's the best word I can think of to describe Nancy Thomas's life. She was born into a dysfunctional family with an alcoholic mother and an absent father. One of her earliest memories is crying while comforting her mother after an abusive man has beaten her. A friend introduced her to marijuana in the 3rd grade. When she was 12, she attempted suicide. She drifted in and out of foster homes and group homes over the next few years. At 17, she learned she was pregnant. She dropped out of school, and began a string of unhealthy and often abusive relationships.

Yet in the midst of all the turmoil, there was one constant in Nancy's life. Mary Frances, the woman Nancy describes as her godmother, was always there for her. When Nancy was very young, Mary Frances sponsored her family at

Christmastime. Something about Nancy touched a place in Mary Frances's heart, and a special bond formed. Mary Frances began taking Nancy to church. She would keep her on the weekends. She would buy Sunday clothes for her and make sure she participated in Sunday school, choir, and summer camp. In the middle of the chaos that was her home life, Nancy found comfort and peace in her relationship with Mary Frances. "I never felt loved by anyone except her," says Nancy. "If it weren't for her, I wouldn't be here. I'd probably be dead or in prison."

Meanwhile, Nancy went through recovery, gave up drugs, and learned that a relationship with Jesus Christ was more powerful than any high she'd gotten smoking pot. Her faith and her faithful godmother helped her establish a life on a more stable foundation. Then, last fall, a lady that Nancy was working for suggested she apply to the Habitat program. "I've tried that," she replied. (She had applied and been denied several years prior.) "You have nothing to lose," her friend replied. So she did, and the rest is history. She feels so blessed to have the opportunity to serve in the Habitat program. "I've learned that there are other people, just like me. Habitat gives us a little push, a reason to hope and go on." She feels the work she does with Habitat is a way for her to "give back". "It's a good thing," she says. She encourages people in the community to sponsor Habitat homes, saying, "God's going to bless you for doing it. It's a way to make your community better."

So, what lies ahead? She's looking forward to planting crepe myrtles in her front yard, having a paved driveway, and being able to afford warmth in the wintertime. "I've never had a house where we were warm." I have a feeling that Nancy's house will be warm all year round, but it won't have anything to do with a thermostat. No, I'm talking about a warmth that radiates from a heart that wants to give back to others just a little of what she herself has received.

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

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
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
